## INFORMATIONAL MEETING FOR MEN INTERESTED IN BECOMING DEACONS FOR THE CLASS OF 2030

The initial meeting for men interested in joining the Deacon Ordination Class of 2030 is scheduled for Saturday, February 3, 2024. This meeting will start at 10:00 a.m. and will be held in

the Cathedral Undercroft. Eligibility to apply is extended to men who will be at least thirty-three years old but not older than fifty-six by September 2025. It should be noted that men who are older than fifty-six in September 2025 may still be considered for the program, but they will need to obtain special

the program, but they will need to obtain <u>special</u> <u>approval</u> from both the Deacon Formation Office and our Bishop before they can move forward with the application process.

cese of Belleville are members. The primary purposes of the Diaconal Community are:

A business meeting of the Diaconal Community is held in conjunction with the meetings with the Bishop that are held 2 to 3 times a year. I hope that you all had a wonderful Thanksgiving and started the day with the Eucharist. This day gives us an opportunity to thank God our Father and also to examine whether we have cultivated "a grateful heart" in our Christian living. We, who stand at the table of

the Lord's own Thanksgiving (Eucharisto, in Greek) almost all our lives, cannot but have our hearts grateful as that of Jesus' who thanked His Father for his death on Good Friday. Thus, Thanksgiving like other Christian feasts, is very close to our hearts!

Now we have entered into the Advent season and we look forward to the celebration of Christmas. Adam's fall has brought Sin and To support the Office of the Permanent Death into the entire creation. Humankind began to live in slavery, sickness, darkness and in utter ignorance in such a way that it cannot recognize its need for God properly and the finality of that need. It is to fulfill its need that humanity was searching within the created order (Wis. Chs. 13-15; Rom.1:18-32). In brief, it did not even recognize its need for the Son of Man! Such was its ignorance! Humanity did not know what exactly it needed, i.e., the Son of Man! God the Father in His merciful love sent His Son in the flesh (in the human nature) to make humanity recognize its need properly and fulfilled its need. Christmas is, then, God fulfilling our need for the Son of Man: the Father fulfilled, not so much our human desire, but our very need for the Son of Man to gain that life which He wanted humanity (the entire creation) to live in the first place. Now being part of the glorified body of Christ, the Son of Man (the Church) we recognize correctly and gratefully respond to His fulfillment of our need. May this Christmas and the joyful season that follows bring us closer to the Son of Man! A Happy
